Trees...

What you need to know

Who owns it and what can I do?

- o If the base of a tree sits on a boundary between yourself and your neighbour then you have joint ownership. **No** work can be undertaken on a jointly owned tree by one owner without permission from the other.
- A climber or creeper belongs to the owner of the soil that it is growing from, not the owner
 of the property it is growing against. If you have a climber or creeper growing against your
 property then you can remove it from your property without your neighbours permission
 but you cannot dig it up.
- o You **cannot** demand that your neighbour cut down branches on their tree which overhang your property boundary.

Overhanging branches, what can I do?

- o If branches are overhanging the boundary onto your property then you **can** cut them off without permission **BUT** only if you can do so without trespassing onto your neighbours property to undertake the work.
- Do not just throw the branches back to your neighbour, you can offer them back, however, ultimate responsibility for their disposal is yours.
- You **cannot** cut back further than your property boundary.
- Watch out for those **Tree Preservation Orders** and **Conservation Areas.** In this instance, prior consent from Blaby District Council **must** be obtained before any work can be undertaken.
- Remember, you are liable if damage is caused to your neighbours tree as a result of your work so be careful and consult a
 qualified tree surgeon if unsure.

Tree debris, what can I do?

- FRUIT You cannot pick or keep fruit which has fallen onto your property from a neighbours tree without their permission. However, if this is overhanging the boundary onto your property and causes damage then the tree owner is liable.
- LEAVES You cannot demand that your neighbour clear away leaves on your property from their tree.
- o **ROOTS** Similarly to overhanging branches, you **can** cut off any roots growing into your property but **remember**, you are liable for any damage which is caused to your neighbours tree as a result.

Birds nesting in tree, what can I do?

- You must be aware of wildlife when it comes to undertaking work on your tree as it is an OFFENCE to damage or destroy bat roosts or birds nests while they are either in use or being built.
- o You **must** avoid tree work at certain times of the year due to the impact on local wildlife.
- There are no restrictions as to what you can plant or where you can plant on your own property but bear in mind the potential future implications of doing so.

REMEMBER..

- o Tree Preservation Orders and Conservation Areas bring their own set of limitations and you cannot undertake work on a tree that falls under either category without first obtaining permission.
- o If you undertake work on overhanging branches which belong to a tree from a neighbouring property, and the work results in damage being caused to the tree, then **you are liable.** Always consult a professional for anything other than the most minor of works.
- o If you own a tree which causes damage to a neighbour or their property then you are liable. Be sure to get your tree inspected regularly.
